• Approved new members Jason Middleton and Sellus Wilder contingent upon no negative response after publication in the newsletter.


• Listened to report from Club Service Director, Nancy Edwards. She noted the new Directory should be going to the publishers in the next two weeks.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Chef Quita Michel. She and her family own Holly Hill, Wallace Station and Cleveland's at the Woodford Inn. She stated that she explores certain countries and regions of the world through cooking, and Kentucky is not an exception. A region's culture is expressed through its food. She gave a little of the history of Holly Hill Inn. It was started in 1979 having been leased from the Rouse family who owned it for 100 years when she purchased it in 2000. It was an inn even before that and has been a place of hospitality for over 200 years. The front porch is 100 years old and the building is located on a 10-acre lot. The property was totally self-supporting and formerly was owned by the Isaac-Parrish family. The Rouse family wanted to keep it open to the public, and therefore sold it with assurances it would stay that way. Chef Michel is totally dedicated to producing Kentuckygrown products, and the mission is to uplift and showcase the community of Midway. She understands what makes Kentucky cuisine special and therefore she obtains uniquely Kentucky food and focuses on Kentucky recipes. She also studies how Indians influenced the food we eat today and examples of wild plants, which have become agricultural crops, include beans, corn, and squash. The Scotch-Irish mastered the art of growing corn and the Scots began home distilling, which we see in the form of moonshine whiskey. The Scots actually introduced home brewing during the American Revolution, which evolved into the bourbon industry of today. Products such as country ham and apple butter came from Virginia as well as fine horses. Although now in decline, tobacco was once the backbone of this state's agriculture. Eating habits are changing today, with fewer people eating meals prepared at home and most eating at restaurants. Unfortunately, farmers are worried because schools are no longer tied to agriculture and are no longer taught as a career. People are moving away from farms and small communities due to a lack of opportunities. She sees her purchases from farmers for her restaurants as a way of keeping people down on the farms. This way, she promotes local agriculture. As tobacco declines, other crops take its place. For example, the aquaculture industry in Kentucky produces good clean shrimp. Wines are also up and coming as a Kentucky-based product. Products served in local restaurants are a local attempt to diversify after the fall of tobacco as a staple of Kentucky's economy. Finally, she stated that she hoped this snapshot of Kentucky food ways gave the Club an oversight in her efforts to help the agricultural industry through her restaurants buying Kentucky products.
