This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Crit Luallen, Auditor of Public Accounts for the state. She stated that she is an independent watchdog for the Kentucky taxpayers, and talked about many of the future challenges of her office. Her office performed about 600 financial audits last year, prosecuted 14 officials and a total of 90 cases were referred for possible prosecution to federal and state authorities. While most local officials are honest, there are still many pockets of corruption here and there. Crit's office is the first line of defense in the area of public corruption. She also does performance audits to help agencies do their jobs more efficiently. For example, the Parks Department is struggling with declining business and fewer tourists

in spite of \$300 million spent in new construction in the state parks. Upon her suggestion, this Department now has a full-time marketing director. Concerning education, unfortunately as tuition has increased in our universities, enrollment has decreased among undergraduates. Kentucky has lost some 1,000 full-time students, and our schools of higher education have fallen short of many of their goals. 59% of new college students are from out-of-state. Concerning our county jails, these are an increasing burden on the counties and broad disparities exist. Her office has performed studies on lowering the costs of operating jails, and she has identified \$19 million in questionable expenses. Crit has also suggested where \$135 million can be cut to increase the efficient running of the jail system. Our state is so strapped for funds that we simply cannot afford any more fraud and abuse. This state needs a sustained commitment over time, but we are spending more on Medicaid and our prisons than on the public schools. Only three of every 20 high schools students will graduate from college. Kentucky has only 82% of the average national income. We are spending more on the problems than on the solutions. Because of drastic budget cuts, we are spending less on essentials like textbooks and extended services to students. The Public Advocacy Department

has had to lay off 10% of its workforce and this is now the subject of litigation. There are several historical barriers to the state moving forward. Among these are a lack of leaders with a vision for the future and to move the state forward. Another historical barrier is that our people lack optimism and self-confidence. We need to improve our self-image as a state. Partisan gridlock is also a historical barrier, and the failure to find a common ground to solve our problems. In spite of all this, Crit is optimistic when she remembers the pioneer spirit that built this state. We need a bold citizenry to move Kentucky forward into the future and she encouraged us all to become more engaged by letting elected leaders hear from you. They will listen. Although we have many spending challenges, there are also many opportunities to move forward ahead for us all.
