This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Tony Curtis with the Kentucky Historical Society. His talk was on the Kentucky Horse Industry. He stated that the story of the horse is part of the history of Kentucky and he raised the questions of why the horse is such an integral part of Kentucky history and what has been the influence of the horse in Kentucky? The Bluegrass region, with its limestone filtered water, partly explains the success of the horse industry here. There are many breeds of horses used in both agriculture and warfare. The horse has historically shaped the landscape of Kentucky and its people and culture. The horse farm with the most number of Derby winners is Calumet Farm at nine. Kentucky is the birthplace of 101 winners of the Derby and the last Kentucky jockey to win the Derby was Don Brumfield in 1966. He spoke about the famous Woodburn Farm in Woodford County, which was owned by the Alexander family as far back as 1790. The most famous racehorse from there was Lexington, who was only defeated once and that was the fault of the jockey. Lexington was the 'king of stallions' and for 16 years was a leading sire. He also spoke of the Harper family's Natura Stud Farm, which was for many years a premiere racing and breeding farm. Famous horses from that farm were Ten Broeck and Longfellow. Billy Walker was a famous African-American jockey who raced in the first Derby in 1875 and won two years later. He also rode Ten Broeck to victory. The study of horses in Kentucky also entails the study of draft horses. Henry Clay brought the first mules to Kentucky in 1830. The influence of the horse in Kentucky also involves the study of immigrant laborers who were prime movers in westward migration, agriculture and the development of urban areas and transportation. To understand the history of Kentucky one must also understand the history of the horse.
