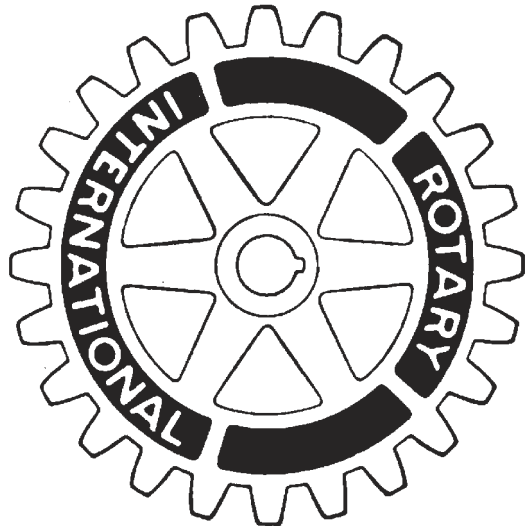

Derrick Napier, 29, is a lifelong Franklin County resident, Patrol Officer with the Frankfort Police Department, President of the Fraternal Order of Police Capital City Lodge #8, spokesman for the Frankfort Police Department Patrolman's Association, member of the United States Police Canine Association, City of Frankfort's Employee Advisory Committee and a member of the Frankfort Police Department's Professional Development Board. This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Jessie Bessinger who is the Wet Weather Coordinator for the City of Frankfort. Her topic was on when it rains in the Capital City. She gave a brief history of Frankfort sewers and where we are going in the future. Until the 1940s there were mostly outbuildings in Frankfort, with pipes going directly into the river. More pipes were continually built which carried sewage, storm water and animal waste. The Water Pollution Act was passed in 1948 to control the discharge of human waste, and in 1955 the first water treatment plant was built which also handled industrial waste. In 1974, the Clean Water Act was passed and in 1978 the first real wastewater plant was built. The Clean Water Act regulated overflow and in 1997 the federal government was trying to make sure the overflow was mostly storm water. In 2007, Frankfort entered into a consent decree with the federal government to handle and decrease overflows. She then proceeded to explain why there are more overflows in some areas than others, noting that native plant and grasses with long roots are able to absorb more water than non-native plants and grasses. This is why runoff is greater in some neighborhoods than others. Although sewer replacements will still

have to be done, it is hoped that with alternatives there will be less runoff. For example, rain barrels and rain gardens reduce this overflow so as to allow the capture of more storm water on one's own property. Other examples used in some cities include recessed areas and grassy knolls in parking lots to keep the storm water from running off into the sewage systems.
