***Next Week's Speaker...***

**Dr. Tom Cottrell**, Enology Extension Specialist at the University of Kentucky and a native of Ithaca, NY, got started in the wine industry in 1970 in the Napa Valley, founding Cuvaison. Later he co-founded Pine Ridge Winery, and started several others as a consultant. In 1982, Dr. Cottrell came to Geneva, NY as Cornell's first Associate Professor of Enology, became acquainted with winemaking in the East, and learned how to make 550 lots of wine in a season. Subsequently, he was the Manager/Winemaker for Chalk Hill Winery in Sonoma County, which he grew from 14,000 cases to 60,000 cases per year, and for Sakonnet Vineyards in Rhode Island, which he grew from 12,000 cases to 35,000 cases per year. Returning to Ithaca in 1995, Dr. Cottrell now consults for wineries and winery start-ups in the Finger Lakes, on Long Island, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, Virginia, and other parts of the East.

In 2005 Tom was asked to serve as the Extension Enologist for the University of Kentucky, and moved to Lexington. He advises

over 64 wineries in the area, manages extensive taste trials for experimental wines, works with the state Alcohol Beverage Control and Ky. Dept. of Agriculture to develop better regulations, and works with Winery and Viticultural associations to develop educational programs. Tom is a member of the American Society for Enology and Viticulture since 1970, he has served the Eastern Section as Secretary, and as a Director. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Engineering Physics from Cornell, a Master's Degree in Solid State Physics from the University of Delaware, and a Ph.D in Laser Optics from the University of Rochester.

**This Week's Speaker...**

The speaker for the day was State Rep. Derrick Graham, who spoke about the accomplishments of the just-completed 2011 General Assembly. He stated that the greatest accomplishment was the passing of the new Criminal Code on which there was bipartisan agreement and cooperation. It will save the state money while at the same time will enhance public safety. The new law will strengthen probation and parole and lower the number of minor drug offenders in prison, which has reached an all-time high. It will provide \$140 million in savings, which is 10% of the cost of running Kentucky's prisons. If criminal code reform was the high point, the low point was Medicaid reform. The stalemate on this issue resulted in the House passing the Senate version and then the Governor used his line-item veto power to take out the cuts to health care and education. In a nutshell, the bill brings money from 2012 into 2011 and relies on managed care, which emphasizes patients going home to be cared for by family members as opposed to going into a nursing home. Under the House plan there were no cuts in Medicaid, even though the current administration made some \$1 billion in cuts in other areas, including state

workers' furloughs. As a result, the budget is three and one-half per cent smaller than last year and the next year will be 1% smaller still. In addition, the administration made \$170 million in other cuts. On a positive note, with the slowly-improving economy it appears that the worst is behind us. Derrick briefly touched on several new laws: (1) On July 4, fireworks will be available to be bought by consumers; (2) An amendment will be placed on the ballot in November to protect hunting and fishing rights; (3) There will be a new study of economic development incentives and improve the business climate in Kentucky to keep existing businesses and bring in new businesses; (4) A task force has been created in an attempt to lower childhood obesity; (5) In a new law dealing with the abuse of adults and children, no one convicted of such abuse may serve as a guardian or administrator or executor of the victim's estate; (6) It will now be possible to keep one's original license plate when the car is sold or traded; (7) A new law gives a boost to Kentucky Pride products. A Senate bill that did not make it in the House included a state employees' defined contribution plan. However, one bill that died in the Senate was to raise the drop-out age in high school to 18. Kentucky is only one of three states that do not have this law and the other states are considering changing their laws.
