• Continuing Education: Each week at Rotary there is a program designed to keep one informed about what is going on in the community, nation, and world. Each meeting provides an opportunity to listen to different speakers and a variety of timely topics.

• Fun: Rotary is fun, a lot of fun. Each meeting is fun. The club projects are fun. Social activities are fun. The service is fun.

• Public Speaking Skills: Many individuals who joined Rotary were afraid to speak in public. Rotary develops confidence and skill in public communication and the opportunity to practice and perfect these skills.

• Citizenship in the World: Every Rotarian wears a pin that says "Rotary International." There are few places on the globe that do not have a Rotary club. parties and activities that provide diversion in one's business life. Rotary holds conferences, conventions, assemblies, and institutes that provide entertainment in addition to Rotary information, education, and service.

• The Development of Social Skills: Every week

and at various events and functions, Rotary develops one's personality, social skills and people skills.

Rotary is for people who like people.

• Family Programs: Rotary provides one of the world's largest youth exchange programs; high school and college clubs for future Rotarians; opportunities for spouse involvement; and a host of activities designed to help family members in growth and the development of family values.

• Vocational Skills: Every Rotarian is expected to take part in the growth and development of his or her own profession or vocation; to serve on committees and to teach youth about one's job or vocation.

Rotary helps to make one a better doctor, lawyer, teacher, etc.

The Development of Ethics: Rotarians practice a 4-Way Test that governs one's ethical standards. Rotarians are expected to be ethical in business and personal relationships.

• Cultural Awareness: Around the world, practically every religion, country, culture, race, creed, political persuasion, language, color, and ethnic identity is found in Rotary. It is a cross section of the world's most prominent citizens from every background. Rotarians become aware of their cultures and learn to love and work with people everywhere. They become better citizens of their countries in the process.

• Prestige: Rotary members are prominent people: leaders of business, the professions, art, government, sports, military, religion, and all disciplines. Rotary is the oldest and most prestigious service club in the world. Its ranks include executives, managers, professionals - people who make decisions and influence policy.

• Nice People: Rotarians above all are nice people - the nicest people on the face of the earth. They are important people who follow the policy of it is nice to be important but it is important to be nice.

 The Absence of an "Official Creed": Rotary has no secret handshake, no secret policy, no official creed, no secret meeting or rituals. It is an open society of men and women who simply believe in helping others.

• The Opportunity to Serve: Rotary is a service club. Its business is mankind. Its product is service. Rotarians provide community service to both local and international communities. This is perhaps the best reason for becoming a Rotarian: the chance to do something for somebody else and to sense the self-fulfillment that comes in the process and return of that satisfaction to one's own life. It is richly rewarding. "He profits most who serves best."



Dr. William H. Crouch Jr. began his era of dynamic leadership-byexample the day he became president of Georgetown College in 1991. Often described as a visionary in not only corporate and academic worlds but also in the community of Christian faith,

Crouch's initiatives at the college include: the establishment of the Foundation Board; the achievement of numerous record-setting fundraising goals; the founding of two often-emulated programs, the President's Ambassadors and the Presidential Mentorship Program; the facilitation of the construction of a new Fine Arts Building, a nationally acclaimed Learning Resource Center and a high profile Athletic and Conference Center Complex, the latter to which he immediately recruited the Cincinnati Bengals' annual summer training camp.

Concurrently, Crouch has been instrumental in increasing Georgetown's enrollment, and vastly expanding the geographical base from which the student body comes, as well as leading the college to a Carnegie Foundation Baccalaureate College I

ranking.

Crouch represents Georgetown on a variety of community boards, including the Georgetown Community Hospital and the Lexington Area Sports Authority. Crouch also holds a seat on the commission on Leadership Development for the American Council on Education. He is also currently serving as Campaign Chair for the annual United Way of the Bluegrass fundraising initiative with a goal of \$10,000,000.

Crouch, the son of a Baptist minister who was also a well-respected educator, is a Louisville, Ky., native. He earned his bachelor's degree from Wake Forest University and his masters and doctorate from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Prior to coming to Georgetown College, he served as a vice president of development at Carson-Newman College. Crouch and his wife, Jan, have four daughters and a son.




- The Development of Social Skills: Every week and at various events and functions, Rotary develops one's personality, social skills and people skills. Rotary is for people who like people.

- · Vocational Skills: Every Rotarian is expected to take part in the growth and development of his or her own profession or vocation; to serve on committees and to teach youth about one's job or vocation. Rotary helps to make one a better doctor, lawyer, teacher, etc.
- The Development of Ethics: Rotarians practice a 4-Way Test that governs one's ethical standards. Rotarians are expected to be ethical in business and personal relationships.
- · Cultural Awareness: Around the world, practically every religion, country, culture, race, creed, political persuasion, language, color, and ethnic identity is found in Rotary. It is a cross section of the world's most prominent citizens from every background. Rotarians become aware of their cultures and learn to love and work with people everywhere. They become better citizens of their countries in the process.
- · Prestige: Rotary members are prominent people: leaders of business, the professions, art, government, sports, military, religion, and all disciplines. Rotary is the oldest and most prestigious service club in the world. Its ranks include executives, managers, professionals people who make decisions and influence policy.
- · Nice People: Rotarians above all are nice people - the nicest people on the face of the earth. They are important people who follow the policy of it is nice to be important but it is important to be nice.
- . The Absence of an "Official Creed": Rotary has no secret handshake, no secret policy, no official creed. no secret meeting or rituals. It is an open society of men and women who simply believe in helping others.
- . The Opportunity to Serve: Rotary is a service club. Its business is mankind. Its product is service. Rotarians provide community service to both local and international communities. This is perhaps the best reason for becoming a Rotarian: the chance to do something for somebody else and to sense the self-fulfillment that comes in the process and return of that satisfaction to one's own life. It is richly rewarding. "He profits most who serves best."
