#### Next Week in Rotary...



Richard Wilson, Interim Director of the UK School of Journalism and Telecommunications, will be the speaker at the April 10 meeting. His topic will be "These Turbulent Times in American Journalism." Fellow Rotarian Tom Braun is in charge of bringing our April speakers to us.

Richard Wilson is one of the most respected journalists anywhere in Kentucky. He will speak to Frankfort Rotary about the current, turbulent times being experienced by American journalists. He will comment on what he regards as the provocation of these challenges and give his views on the future for this important part of our national culture.

Last month he was named interim director of the School of Journalism and Telecommunications at his alma mater, the University of Kentucky. He is slated to serve in this capacity for at least one year, or until completion of the search for a permanent director of the school. This is located in the Enoch Grehan Building in the heart of the main campus, which is about to observe its 50th year of service to Kentucky's budding journalists.

For more than 30 years he worked for The Courier-Journal of Louisville, in both the Frankfort and Lexington Bureaus. During these years he specialized in reporting and insightful coverage of all of Kentucky's major universities. In alternate years he also worked intensively in Frankfort to cover sessions of the Kentucky General Assembly. He also wrote extensively about politics, state government affairs, and both elementary and secondary education. Very often Richard Wilson was a guest panelist on the popular KET program, Comment on Kentucky, chaired by fellow journalist Al Smith.

He and his wife, Debbie, are Frankfort residents. He retired in mid-1999 from his post as bureau manager for The Courier-Journal in Lexington, shortly after his induction in the Kentucky Journalism Hall of Fame. Since then he has been an adjunct professor of journalism at Kentucky State University. He also has coordinated a state government-related program for interns in Frankfort for private college students.



Gordon Davies, Ph.D., President of the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education will be the speaker at the Wednesday, April 17 meeting of the Frankfort Rotary Club. His topic will be "Postsecondary Education." He will be introduced by Tom Braun, Program Chair for April.

Gordon Davies is president of the Council on Postsecondary Education in Kentucky, which oversees the entire spectrum of postsecondary education in the state. He will speak to the Rotary Club of Frankfort April 17 on postsecondary education and where it stands today in our state. Dr. Davies is in charge of the agency that was created by the Kentucky General Assembly in 1997 as part of sweeping reforms in higher education as envisioned by Gov. Paul E. Patton.

Davies joined the council in 1998 as its first president, had been director of the Virginia State Council of Higher Education for 20 years, 1977-97. Before coming to Kentucky, Davies was a

visiting professor in the Department of Organization and Leadership at Columbia University's Teachers College.

Dr. Davies has written and spoken widely on key issues in postsecondary education. He holds the Ph.D. and Master's from Yale in the philosophy of religion. His undergraduate major at Yale was English.

#### This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Richard Wilson, a former reporter for the Courier Journal. He stated that the events of 9/11 had a positive long-term impact on journalism. The papers rose to the call and commercial considerations were put aside.

This is in contrast to journalism in the '80s and '90s, when the news was softer and less significant. There were several reasons for this, including that the networks are not owned by media people, the constant turnover in newspapers owned by chains who know nothing about the communities, migrating editors, chain ownership pressures papers to make more profits, and the advent of the Internet and cable TV. Newspapers often emulate the tabloids. He spoke about the "dumbing down" of the news, but up until 9/11, this softening of the news did not work with declining readers and viewers. That all changed with 9/11.





# Answers to the Question: "Why Join Rotary?"

- Friendship: In an increasingly complex world, Rotary provides one of the most basic human needs: the need for friendship and fellowship. It is one of two reasons why Rotary began in 1905.
- Business Development: The second original reason for Rotary's beginning is business development. Everyone needs to network. Rotary consists of a cross section of every business community. Its members come from all walks of life. Rotarians help each other and collectively help others.
- Personal Growth and Development: Membership in Rotary continues one's growth and education in human relations and personal development.
- Leadership Development: Rotary is an organization of leaders and successful people. Serving in Rotary positions is like a college education. Leadership: learning how to motivate, influence, and lead leaders.
- Citizenship in the Community: Membership in a Rotary club makes one a better community citizen. The average Rotary club consists of the most active citizens of any community.
- Continuing Education: Each week at Rotary there is a program designed to keep one informed about what is going on in the community, nation, and world. Each meeting provides an opportunity to listen to different speakers and a variety of timely topics.
- Fun: Rotary is fun, a lot of fun. Each meeting is fun. The club projects are fun. Social activities are fun. The service is fun.
- Public Speaking Skills: Many individuals who joined Rotary were afraid to speak in public. Rotary develops confidence and skill in public communication and the opportunity to practice and perfect these skills.
- Citizenship in the World: Every Rotarian wears a pin that says "Rotary International." There are few places on the globe that do not have a Rotary club. Every Rotarian is welcome even encouraged to attend any of the 29,000 clubs in 194 nations and geographical regions. This means instant friends in both one's own community and in the world community.

- The Development of Social Skills: Every week and at various events and functions, Rotary develops one's personality, social skills and people skills. Rotary is for people who like people.

• Family Programs: Rotary provides one of the world's largest youth exchange programs; high school and college clubs for future Rotarians; opportunities for spouse involvement; and a host of activities designed to help family members in growth and the development of family values.

• Vocational Skills: Every Rotarian is expected to take part in the growth and development of his or her own profession or vocation; to serve on committees and to teach youth about one's job or vocation. Rotary helps to make one a better doctor, lawyer, teacher, etc.

• The Development of Ethics: Rotarians practice a 4-Way Test that governs one's ethical standards. Rotarians are expected to be ethical in business and personal relationships.

• Cultural Awareness: Around the world, practically every religion, country, culture, race, creed, political persuasion, language, color, and ethnic identity is found in Rotary. It is a cross section of the world's most prominent citizens from every background. Rotarians become aware of their cultures and learn to love and work with people everywhere. They become better citizens of their countries in the process.

• Prestige: Rotary members are prominent people: leaders of business, the professions, art, government, sports, military, religion, and all disciplines. Rotary is the oldest and most prestigious service club in the world. Its ranks include executives, managers, professionals - people who make decisions and influence policy.

Nice People: Rotarians above all are nice people
 the nicest people on the face of the earth. They are important people who follow the policy of it is nice to be important but it is important to be nice.

• The Absence of an "Official Creed": Rotary has no secret handshake, no secret policy, no official creed, no secret meeting or rituals. It is an open society of men and women who simply believe in helping others.

The Opportunity to Serve: Rotary is a service club. Its business is mankind. Its product is service. Rotarians provide community service to both local and international communities. This is perhaps the best reason for becoming a Rotarian: the chance to do something for somebody else and to sense the self-fulfillment that comes in the process and return of that satisfaction to one's own life. It is richly rewarding. "He profits most who serves best."

#### This Week's Speaker

Daniel Rabuzzi, Ph.D., vice president for economic initiatives at the Council on Postsecondary Education and CEO of the Kentucky Virtual University was this week's guest speaker. Dr. Rabuzzi was appointed as CEO of the two-year-old Kentucky Virtual University (KYVU) in December 2001 after serving as acting CEO since June 2001.

The KYVU is the state's official virtual campus. It opened its doors to students in the fall of 1999. KYVU offers one-stop access to affordable college credit courses and professional development programs offered online from colleges, universities and other institutions.

Before coming to the Council on Postsecondary Education in 1999, Rabuzzi was a faculty member at Luther College in Iowa. He holds degrees from Harvard, Tufts and John Hopkins University.

In his capacity as CEO Dr. Rabuzzi has improved the systems of the Kentucky Virtual University and the Kentucky Virtual Library. During this time the number of degree programs offered and the number of students enrolled has continued to increase. Dr. Rabuzzi and his staff continue targeting new markets statewide to promote access to online learning.

Dr. Rabuzzi stated that KYVU's online learning programs holds many advantages such as: earning a degree from the college of your choice; start or finish a degree online from your home; work full time and go to college; keep your busy family schedule and still attend college. Online learning gives you the flexibility to meet your education goals at your convenience – any place, any time!

#### Nine Rotarians Brave Rain for Cleanup


