This Week's Speaker...

The program for the day was introduced by Past District Governor Bill Miller for February as World Understanding Month. He kicked off the program with a videotape which told about the partnership Rotary has had with the United Nations dating back to 1945. Bill told of the importance of the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the Center for Disease Control in improving lives of children and adults around the globe. Rotary Day at the United Nations was actually an initiative begun by the Frankfort Rotary Club back in 1989. He then introduced Lee Troutwine who spoke about the potable water project with Frankfort's Sister City in the Dominican Republic. Dean Sorg spoke about the Ambassadorial Scholarship program. This year, the District sent Meredith Jones to New Zealand and the program fosters international peace and understanding. It is funded through the Rotary Foundation and he emphasized the importance of giving to the Foundation. Greg Fuchs then spoke about the Rotary Youth Exchange. Rotarians need to ask high school students to participate since the more students we send abroad, the more students will come here and vice versa.

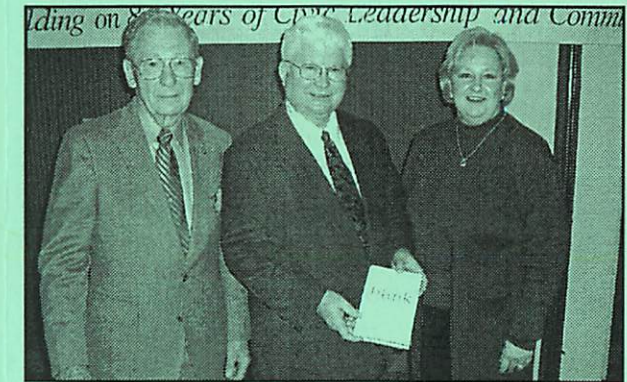

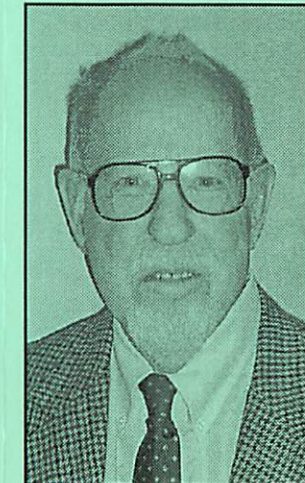

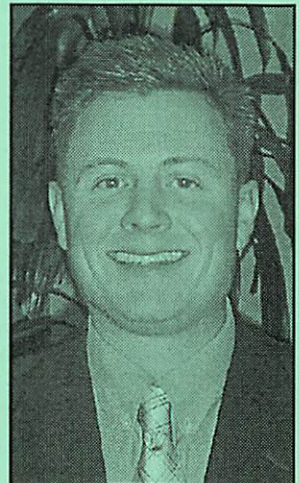

Justin Janes
Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar

Justin Janes was born and reared in Bardstown, Kentucky. He graduated from Bethlehem Catholic High School and received a soccer scholarship to attend Spalding University. After his freshman year at Spalding, he transferred to the University of Louisville where he graduated, magna cum laude with a major in Political Science in 2002. While at U of L, Justin participated in two overseas study courses sponsored by the Honors Program. The first overseas course in 2000 took him to Ireland, where he studied James Joyce and W. B. Yeats, while the second, in 2001, took him to Kenya where he studied socio-economic development. Also during his undergraduate career, Justin served as a Legislative Research Commission Intern in the Office of the Staff Economist during the 2002 General Assembly Session.

After graduating from U of L, Justin received a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship to study International Relations at Victoria University, in Wellington, New Zealand. Before leaving for his year abroad, Justin spent six months teaching computer science to junior high students at New Haven Grade School, in New Haven, Kentucky.

At Victoria, Justin undertook and completed a B. A. Honours Degree in International Relations, which included studies in conflict resolution, non-governmental organizations and development, international political economy and political leadership. Outside of the classroom, Justin was assigned to the Port Nicholson Rotary Club, and he delivered nine presentations to various Rotary Clubs throughout New Zealand. Justin also took an active role in establishing the Wellington Rotaract Club, and he assisted in the organization and execution of several service projects, such as the Rumataka Forest Initiative and the Ronald McDonald House Dinner Project. During school holidays, Justin traveled throughout both the North and South Islands of New Zealand, hiking, biking and kayaking whenever possible.

Presently, Justin is living in Fort Wright, Kentucky and working in a law firm in Cincinnati, with plans to return to graduate school in the near future. In addition, Justin will be marrying his girlfriend, Betsy Berns, also a U of L graduate, this July in Fort Wright.

Next Week's Program...

David V. Hawpe is vice president and editorial director of The Courier-Journal. In that position he directs the opinion pages of Kentucky's largest newspaper. He teaches writing and media ethics at the University of Kentucky School of Journalism, from which he graduated in 1965. Mr. Hawpe is former president of the national Associated Press Managing Editors group, and now serves as treasurer of the APME Foundation. He serves on the editorial board of the University Press of Kentucky, and is a member of the board of visitors for the journalism school at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Hawpe was named to the Kentucky Journalism Hall of Fame in 1994.

After graduating from UK, Hawpe worked two years for the Associated Press, then two years as an editorial writer at "The St. Petersburg Times" in Florida. He returned to Kentucky to serve as Eastern Kentucky correspondent for The Courier-Journal, covering health, safety, environmental and political issues. He was lead reporter in the newspaper's coverage of the Hyden mine disaster. Hawpe was instrumental in The Courier-Journal's Pulitzer Prize-winning coverage of the humanitarian crisis in Cambodia (1979) and the Carrollton Bus Crash (1987).

After serving two years on the Courier-Journal editorial board, Hawpe was named a Nieman Fellow at Harvard University for the 1974-75 academic year. Upon his return to the newspaper, he served as assistant state editor, city editor of The Louisville Times, and starting in 1979, as managing editor of The Courier-Journal. He was named editor of The Courier-Journal in 1987, and became vice president and editorial director in 1996.

He lives in Louisville, and is married to Linda Shadoin Hawpe. He is the father of two sons, Christopher and Jonathan and has two grandchildren, Xavier and Scarlett.

This Week's Speaker....

The speaker for the day was Justin William Janes, a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar to New Zealand in 2004. His talk was broken into three parts concerning the history of the Ambassadorial Scholarship, the country of New Zealand, and Rotary in New Zealand. The Ambassadorial Scholarship was started in 1947 commemorating the death of Paul Harris and the aim is to foster goodwill through service and fellowship. It is the world's largest privately-funded program, and in 2003 there were 1100 scholars. New Zealand

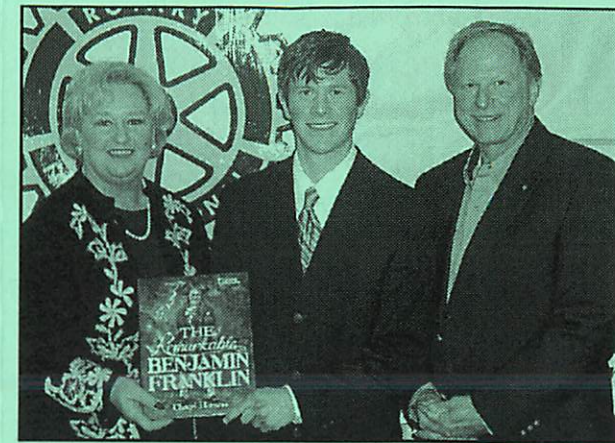
itself consists of two islands off the east coast of Australia, and is a very cosmopolitan country with 3.5 million people. The main industries are agriculture and tourism, and the ethnic groups are mainly Anglo-Saxon and Maori. He showed a picture of a meeting house known as a Marae. The Holy Church of New Zealand and rugby are what binds the country together. He also talked about the Southerlies, cold wet storms from Antarctica which beset the country. He showed a picture of a Te Papa ("Our House") and is a cultural museum. He also spoke about the academic programs he took in Victoria University of Wellington and his course work there. Concerning Rotary in New Zealand, his sponsoring club was in Port Nicholson, a breakfast club. Their big project was Breakfast with the Prime Minister. He had nine speaking engagements in New Zealand. His Rotary Club had as its project the Karori Sanctuary, which was a Green Space project and he started a Rotaract Club there. It is interesting that New Zealand is the last country in the world to be populated by humans. Thank you Justin for a very informative talk on your Ambassadorial Scholarship experiences.

Rotary Profile: John Shasky



John Shasky was born about forty years ago in Chicago and as his athletic skills developed moved on to Brother Rice High School, Birmingham, Michigan. After excelling in basketball there he played at the University of Minnesota. John must hold the record for having lived a lot of places, namely:

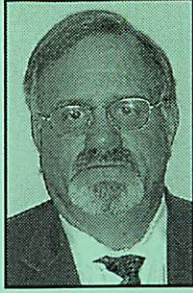
International Dinner a Success
