



### Next Week's Program...

A native of Louisville and a seventh generation Kentuckian, **Kent Whitworth** joined the Kentucky Historical Society staff as director in January 2004. He currently serves on the Council for the American Association for State and Local History.

Whitworth served as the director of the East Tennessee Historical Society from 1995 through 2003, where they more than doubled the size of the East Tennessee History Center and its educational programming. He also spent 5½ years as the director of Blount Mansion, a registered national historic landmark in Knoxville.

Kent earned his B.A. in History from Asbury College in Wilmore, KY where he later served as director of marketing and public relations for four years. He earned his M.A. in History with an emphasis in Historic Preservation from Middle Tennessee State University (Murfreesboro, TN.) In 1990, he participated in the Seminar for Historical Administration at Colonial Williamsburg.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was John Nicholson, Executive Director of the Kentucky Horse Park. He has just returned from the World Equestrian Games in Aachen, Germany. Kentucky will host the games in 2010. In the 1960's the Bluegrass horse farms were locked out to the public and therefore the people's park, the Kentucky Horse Park, evolved from this. Today there are some 30 equestrian organizations at the Horse Park, which will be the site of the Equestrian Games. There are three private-sector jobs for every government job at the Horse Park. Equestrian sports are moving to the United States and we see this in the Equestrian Games. They will consist of eight

sports over a 16-day period. The sports are as follows: (1) Dressage (2) Cross Country (3) Grand Prix jumping, which is also an Olympian sport (4) Driving horses four at a time (5) Reining, which measures the horses' mobility in dealing with stock (6) Endurance, which is a 100-mile race much like a marathon (7) Vaulting, wherein gymnastics are performed on horseback (8) For the first time, the world championship will include the disabled to be integrated as part of the competition. Disabled athletes are being brought into the mainstream of the equestrian sports. The Games will demonstrate diversity in the United States, which include music and other cultural expressions. 500,000 people are expected to attend and 57 countries will be represented. There will be 1,000 athletes and 1,000 media people from all over the world. The Games will be broadcast to over 100 countries. Needless to say, this will have a great economic impact on this part of the state. Alltech is a cash sponsor to the tune of \$10 million. State monies will not be involved, and the Games have a governing board with Jim Host as president of the Foundation. The Games will send a message worldwide who we are as a people and will give us an opportunity to make many new friends. The Games will increase Kentucky's international profile in economic terms, and the equine landscape will change here forever. There will be a new hotel, arena and stadium as part of the Games. Thank you John for a most interesting program on the 2010 Equestrian Games coming to the Horse Park.

**Judge Mary Noble** 

Judge Mary C. Noble obtained a B.S. degree in English from Austin Peay State University in 1971 and a M.A. degree in psychology in 1975. She attended law school at the University of Kentucky in Lexington, and received her J.D. in December 1981. She served as Domestic Relations commissioner before she was elected to the bench in 1992, and served two terms as Chief Judge of the Fayette Circuit Court, a court of general jurisdiction. Additionally, she has been a Drug Court judge since 1996. She has served as President of the Congress of State Drug Courts Association and is currently on the Board of the National Association of Drug Court Professionals. In 2004, she received the Stanley M. Goldstein Award for Preeminent Contribution to the Drug Court Field.

Judge Noble has contributed articles to several publications and has been a speaker on a variety of legal topics. She has served as State Chair of the Gender Fairness in the Courts Committee, on the Juvenile Justice Advisory Board, and the Attorney General's Task Force on Prescription Drug Abuse. She presently serves on the state

Civil Rules Committee, the AOC Drug Court Advisory Committee, and is First Vice President of the Circuit Judges' Association of Kentucky. She is on the Board of Chrysalis House, a residential treatment facility for women; the Helenic Ideals Program, which annually honors citizens who express the ideals of democracy and public service, and the Fayette Family Court Advisory Committee. As a practitioner, Judge Noble was a litigation attorney, practicing in the areas of school law, personal injury and criminal law.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was fellow Rotarian Kent Whitworth, Director of the Kentucky Historical Society. His talk was on Kentucky's Lincoln Bicentennial: A National Celebration and A Kentucky Story. Before he began his formal presentation, he had much praise for Barry K. Holder, Sr. and Colonel Arthur Kelly for their invaluable contributions to the Rotary Education Initiative, whereby a fund has been set up to transport city and county fourth graders to the History Center. The Lincoln Bicentennial Commission recently sponsored the Daniel Boone exhibit at the State Fair, which was visited by some 16,000 fairgoers. Kentucky leads the nation in its oral history programs and specializes in audio and video recordings to bring Kentucky history to life. The Historical Society has partnered with the Genealogical Society to bring characters to life from Kentucky's past. A Lewis and Clark exhibit from the Filson Society is coming to Frankfort on October 5. In Kentucky, the Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission was started by Executive Order on June 18, 2004, co-chaired by Senator Dan Kelly. It is administered by the Kentucky Historical Society. \$4 million has gone to the Commission, with \$2 million going for a Lincoln statue by the Louisville Waterfront sculpted by Ed Hamilton. This Lincoln statue will be the first state memorial. There will also be theatrical productions planned by Washington County.

Justice John Roach was born and raised in Frankfort, Kentucky. He graduated from the University of Kentucky College of Law with high distinction and received his undergraduate degree from Washington & Lee University. While in law school, he served as Articles Editor of the Kentucky Law Journal, and was inducted into the Order of the Coif. After graduation from law school. Roach served as a law clerk for the Honorable Pierce Lively, Senior Judge, United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit. Upon completion of the clerkship, Roach moved to Washington, D.C. and was an attorney with Akin, Gump, Strauss, Hauer & Feld, LLP. He returned to Kentucky in 1995 and was a partner in the law firm of Ransdell, Roach & Wier, PLLC in Lexington, Kentucky from 1996 until 2001 where his practice focused on employment discrimination, commercial litigation and corporate transactions.

In addition to a vigorous trial practice, Roach has argued cases before the Kentucky Supreme Court, the Kentucky Court of Appeals and the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit. Before his appointment to the Kentucky Supreme Court on June 10, 2005 by Governor

Ernie Fletcher, Roach served as General Counsel to Governor Fletcher.

Roach lives in Lexington with his wife, Maria, and their two children, Catherine and Bennett.

This Week's Speaker...

Fayette Circuit Judge Mary C. Noble, who is running for a seat on the Kentucky Supreme Court in the November election, spoke about the drug court program she initiated in Fayette County. The program is now in a number of other counties. By 2008 there will be sufficient funds for every KY county that wants the drug court program to have one.

Judge Noble described her background that led her to become a teacher and, after earning her JD and becoming a domestic relations commis-

court. Her grandfather, who taught himself to read, encouraged her to become a teacher. As a high school English teacher, guidance counselor and college psychology teacher, she observed the deterioration of young people through the use of drugs. As a domestic relations commissioner, she observed the impact of drug use on families, noting that it is second only to money as the cause of families breaking up. After she was elected to the bench in 1991, she continued to be concerned about the problem. In 1995, following a huge drug bust in Fayette County, she began researching what courts could do to respond to the problem. The result was a program that the ordinary, seriously-addicted person who is not a violent offender can voluntarily enter. If a judge admits the person to the program, he or she must agree to work, go into treatment, be randomly tested for drugs at least 3 time per week, and pay obligations such as child support. The person must follow through in order to stay in the program. The program, with the motto "Live free: drug-free," is now a national and even international model. The per-person cost of the program per year is about 10% of the cost of incarcerating a person for a year. Compared with a recidivism rate of almost 70% among addicts imprisoned for drug-related offenses, the recidivism rate of those in the Fayette drug court program over its first 10 years is 13%. She recounted the inspiring example of an addicted Viet Nam veteran who completed the program and went on to earn his Ph.D. last spring. Judge Noble stated that the concept of drug court is a prime example of how courts and other governmental institutions should look for solutions to problems and them determine how to implement those solutions. The book "Famous Kentucky Duels" will be donated to the KSU Library in Judge Noble's honor.

**Group Study Exchange News** 


