John Edward Kleber, Professor of HIstory

John Edward Kleber was born in Louisville, Kentucky. He graduated summa cum laude from Bellarmine University (1963) and received two graduate degrees from the University of Kentucky (MA 1965) and (Ph.D. 1969). His major was history and minor philosophy. He has done post-graduate study at the University of California, Irvine. In 1968 he was hired as an assistant professor of history at Morehead State University in Morehead, and retired 28 years later as professor emeritus. In 1971 he was promoted to associate professor and to full professor in 1976. He was director of the Academic Honors Program (1973-88) and the interim dean of the Caudill College of Humanities (1993-95). Kleber received both the Outstanding Teacher (1982) and Distinguished Researcher (1993) Awards from Morehead State. He was given the Outstanding Civil Service Medal by the United States Army (1971), the Governor's Outstanding Kentuckian Award (1992), and the Catholic Alumni Award by the Archdiocese of Louisville (2002). He is a distinguished alumnus of Trinity High School and Bellarmine University. He was a member of the Kentucky Oral History Commission, the Kentucky Humanities Council Board and the Kentucky Historical Society Executive Committee. He is Adjunct Professor of History and Senior Fellow at the McConnell Center at the University of Louisville. He is the editor of six books: The Public Papers of Lawrence W. Wetherby, The Kentucky Encyclopedia, The Encyclopedia of Louisville, A Home for Children: A History of Brooklawn, The New History of Shelby County, Kentucky, and Thomas D. Clark of Kentucky: An Uncommon Life in the Commonwealth. He resides in Louisville.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Transportation

Secretary Bill Nighbert who was appointed by the Governor in March 2005. He oversees operations for maintaining and improving the transportation infrastructure of the state, including 27,438 miles of roads, 160 licensed airports, 23 public transportation systems, and the registration of 2.7 million licensed drivers and 3.4 million vehicles annually. He stated that the Transportation building has an operations center separate from the cabinet, that also houses several federal agencies. He spoke about the Equestrian Games coming up in 2010, which will add \$150 million to the economy of the region. \$10 million in improvements are being made to the Horse Park. 900 employees work in the building, which can accommodate up to 1400. This year, there will be spent some \$1.3-1.5 billion on highways and that there is a \$405 million cash reserve. The Department is being operated with 1000 fewer employees, which has been done through attrition and increased efficiency. Secretary Nighbert also announced the creation of a Department of Safety with the Transportation Cabinet of which he is proud. Three bills were recently passed by the General Assembly which have had a major impact on highway safety: (1) The graduated license for teenagers; (2) The Quick Clearance Law by which an accident which did not result in serious injury can be quickly removed to reduce "rubber-necking" and thereby reduce accidents; (3) The primary seat belt law, which has cut down on fatalities. For example, Kentucky was number one in the South for reduction in fatalities. All law enforcement personnel now have a GPS system to reduce response time to accidents and to help identify which road segments have safety issues. Although in light of the Minnesota bridge disaster, the federal government will put more emphasis on bridges, more money is needed to improve our roads as well. His department spends \$.5.5 million dollars per day. There are several major bridges in

Kentucky that do need replacing but \$7 billion will be needed for this task alone which would use up all of Kentucky's federal money for the next 15 years. Road conditions have improved substantially in the state. At one time 50% of the roads were in poor or fair condition but now only 22% fall in this category, with the rest being good or excellent. In responding to questions from the floor, he stated that his department spends annually \$35 million in mass transit. The Capital Avenue Bridge needs replacing in Frankfort and this is a higher priority than the Singing Bridge. In honor of Secretary Nighbert's talk, the book titled "Why Did the Chicken Cross the Road?' has been donated to the Bridgeport Elementary School.



Next Week's Program...

Kent Masterson Brown Attorney, Author, Civil War Historian

Born in Lexington, Kentucky February 5, 1949, Mr. Brown is a graduate of Centre College of Kentucky in 1971. He received his juris doctor degree from Washington & Lee University School of Law in Lexington, Virginia in 1974. For the past 33 years, he has practiced law from his office in Lexington, Kentucky and as of counsel to Webster, Chamberlain & Bean in Washington, D.C. Mr. Brown was the creator and first editor of the magazine, "The Civil War." He is the author of several books, including "Cushing of Gettysburg: The Story of a Union Artillery Commander" and "The Civil War in Kentucky: Battle for the Bluegrass State." He reissued and re-illustrated A.D. Kirwan's "Johnny Green of the Orphan Brigade" in 2002; it was recipient of the Basil W. Duke Award for the best reprint of the year.

Mr. Brown's most recent book, "Retreat from Gettysburg: Lee, Logistics and the Pennsylvania Campaign," was released in April of 2005 and received rave reviews and several awards. He has written numerous articles for scholarly historical journals, and regularly leads Civil War battlefield tours.

Mr. Brown was the first Chairman of the Gettysburg National Military Park Advisory Commission, having been appointed by President George Herbert Walker Bush. He was the first Chairman of the Perryville Battlefield Commission, appointed by Governor Brereton Jones. Mr. Brown is currently a member of the Kentucky Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission. He has been given numerous awards for his work in Civil War history as well as historic preservation. Mr. Brown lives in Lexington with his wife Genevieve and their children Annie Louise, Philip and Thomas.



This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was John Edward

Kleber, professor of History at the University of Louisville. He spoke about the upcoming Lincoln Bicentennial celebrations at some 40 sites in Kentucky that have Lincoln connections. These include the Lincoln birthplace in Hodgenville, Camp Nelson, Perryville Battlefield, Mary Todd Lincoln House, the Farmington Historic Home in Louisville and Cumberland Gap to name just a few. The Ed Hamilton statue on the riverbank in Louisville will be dedicated in honor of our 16th president who was born in and spent the first seven years of his life in Kentucky before moving on to Spencer County Indiana and then on to Illinois. Lincoln returned to Kentucky on four occasions but on his way to his inauguration he stopped in Cincinnati and intended to go to Covington to give a speech but did not do so considering he received only 1,366 votes in Kentucky when he ran for president in 1860. Had he given that speech, it would have stated, "I too am a Kentuckian." There are many ways he touched Kentucky and was touched by Kentucky. The celebration will reach a climax on February 12, 2009 with the 200th anniversary of Lincoln's birth. To get a jump on Illinois, the first signature event will occur on February 12, 2008 when President Bush will officiate at the place of Lincoln's birth in Hodgenville. On February 12, 1909, President Roosevelt took the presidential train to Lincoln's birthplace to lay the cornerstone to the granite building that contains the Lincoln cabin. Many veterans of the Civil War on both sides were present and there is a saying that Kentucky joined the confederacy after the end of the Civil War. Up until 1896, the political leaders of Kentucky were mostly Confederate veterans or sympathizers. Lincoln's grandfather came to Kentucky through Cumberland Gap and Lincoln married a member of Kentucky's aristocracy, Mary Todd. There will be many special events and

legacy projects to commemorate the birth of Lincoln. Kentucky contributed to the making of Lincoln the man and president in several ways: (1) Kentucky gave him his nasal drawl; (2) Kentucky gave Lincoln his frontier humor; (3) Kentucky gave him knowledge of hard work; (4) It gave him his gift for self-deprecation; (5) Finally, Kentucky gave Lincoln his propensity for story-telling. In honor of our speaker, the Kentucky Encyclopedia will be donated to the Bondurant Middle School.



Lee Todd, President, University of Kentucky

Lee T. Todd Jr. became the 11th president of the University of Kentucky on July 1, 2001. He is a native of Earlington, Ky. and a graduate of UK and MIT. President Todd is the sixth UK alum to hold the presidency. He is a former engineering professor; a successful businessman who launched two worldwide technology companies, both based in Kentucky; and a public advocate for research, technology and an entrepreneurial economy in Kentucky. President Todd is a member of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee for the American Council on Education and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges. He also serves on NASULGC's President's Council. He serves on the Equitable Resources Board of Directors and is Chair of the National Science Foundation's Education and Human Resources Advisory Committee. He is Chair of the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) Task Force & member of Business Higher Education Forum and the Council on Competitiveness.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Attorney Kent Masterson Brown, who spoke about Kentucky and the Civil War and Kentucky's identity problem of being a Northern or Southern state. He asked why did the UK band at one time play "Dixie" even though Kentucky was officially neutral and not a Confederate state. 85,000 Kentuckians fought for the North and 35,000 for the South. Most Kentuckians were from Virginia on the eve of the Civil War but most of their children had moved North to Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. This was one reason Kentucky did not leave the Union with so much of their families in the North, even though there were about 250,000 African-American slaves in Kentucky in a population of one million, most of whom were slave owners. Another reason Kentucky did not leave the Union was that the Ohio River was vital to Kentucky's economy and if Kentucky were to secede, this would disrupt the flow of commerce. On the other hand, Kentucky in 1860 voted mostly been a Whig party. Representatives from the South prevailed upon a pro-Southern governor to persuade the legislature to secede, but failed to do so after two special sessions. Kentucky formed a pro-Union Home Guard to counter the pro-Confederate State Guard. On May 20, 1861, Kentucky was officially declared to be neutral. As a consequence, Tennessee fortified its borders with various forts to defend against the North, which it feared would use Kentucky as a base to attack the Confederacy. In June of 1861, Kentucky's Congressional representation was 10-1 Union and the legislature was 4-1 pro-Union. Columbus, Kentucky was seized by General Polk for the South, which invaded Kentucky, and General Grant took up a position in Paducah. Grant proceeded to capture Fort Henry on the Tennessee River and then Fort Donaldson, All Confederate forces then withdrew from Kentucky. Kentucky regarded the Union as an occupying force of a neutral state. The Union military governors ordered all persons to take an oath to the Union and those that refused were deported. A military governor, Jerry Boyle, even ordered a Southern sympathizer off the ballot for a Court of Appeals seat, but the candidate was elected as a write-in. Boyle also ordered the arrest of any candidate who was hostile to the Union government, and seized slaves to build military railroads and highways. Confederate General Bragg withdrew from Kentucky after the Battle of Perryville and then the Emancipation Proclamation was signed freeing the slaves -- except it did not apply to Kentucky, which was not in rebellion. A second military governor named Burbridge executed Confederate prisoners as reprisals for various Southern atrocities, and the Union became very unpopular for both the harshness of the military government and the Emancipation Proclamation. Thus Kentucky can be said to have joined

for the Constitutional Union Party of Bell and

the Republican Party under Lincoln received

few votes. Up until this time, Kentucky had

the Confederacy after the Civil War and for decades afterwards elected Confederate veterans and sympathizers to many offices and judgeships. Simon Buckner, who had long been active in the Confederate movement, was twice elected governor. Now we know why the UK band played Dixie at half-time.



This Week's Speaker...

This week's speaker was University of KY President Lee Todd. President Todd thanked Rotary for its good work, especially its international programs for students. He discussed his initiative to make UK a Top 20 university, including the needs and challenges that initiative addresses and its accomplishments to date. He is currently embarked on a 15 city "See Blue" Tour of Kentucky to promote the university's academic programs, in particular. He is encouraged by the response, which he attributed, at least in part, to UK's current athletic successes, making his job a bit easier. He stressed the importance of academics that benefit not only UK, but especially its home state of KY. While some faculty initially viewed the Top 20 business plan he instituted skeptically, university personnel have embraced its emphasis on making a difference for the state and region. He described UK's recent accomplishments in improving the quality of undergraduate education, graduate education, faculty, and research. Dr. Todd noted that many of UK's research efforts focus on the local economy (e.g., an entrepreneurship program for tobacco-dependent counties) and the health and welfare of Kentucky citizens (including addressing such "Kentucky uglies" as poor dental health, math and prescription drug abuse). Community Food Drive




