John J. Johnson, Executive Director of the



KY Commission on Human Rights, was born February 10, 1945 in Louisville, Kentucky. His lifetime of leadership started at age 17, when he became the youngest president of any Kentucky chapter of the NAACP. Johnson worked in a factory after his

high school graduation. He then served as coordinator of training services for the Kentucky Institute for Community Development. In 1969 he accepted a position as director of operations for a national marketing and research firm based in New York. He returned to Kentucky and worked with several War on Poverty programs before assuming the position as associate director of the Louisville and Jefferson County Human Relations Commission. He was later appointed director of community services for the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights. In 1984, he became the director of the Louisville and Jefferson County Community Action Agency until he joined the staff of the national NAACP in Baltimore.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Sherman Riggs, Past President of the Shelbyville Rotary Club, who spoke about their club's scholarship programs. Since 1985, his club has made 153 loans to 57 college and graduate students that total \$246,240. Under the Student Loan Program the money is recycled for loans going to students for college and trade schools. The students must have at least a "B" average in high school and maintain a "C" average in college. There are seven official members on the student loan board, with ten members being emeritus. There are various guidelines for a loan, and the program is operated by businessmen on a business footing. This means there is a promissory note

required. There have only been four lawsuits over repayment since 1985 and no money has been lost due to bad loans. The guidelines are incorporated in the promissory note and the loans are made 1/2 in the Fall and 1/2 in the Spring. The net worth of the fund is \$144,000, which includes loans to be repaid. Although the program has not been without controversy, nevertheless the philosophy here is that more money can be loaned out than given away -more families can be helped through the loan concept than through outright scholarships. The Club has sponsored numerous fish fries and pancake breakfasts to raise funds for the loan program. The interest rate is 1% while the student is in school, there is a six-month grace period after school, and finally there is a 3% interest rate after that when, hopefully, the former student now has a job. The school transcripts are checked twice a year to verify the grade point average and at that time the money is both collected and dispersed. The Student Loan Program is loosely based on similar programs in Owenton and Hopkinsville. Hopkinsville has the best scholarship program in all of Rotary International with some \$30 million in reserves. The goal there is to make sure that every young person in Christian County who wants to go to college has that opportunity. The Shelbyville loan program makes a loan of \$4,000 per student for four years. Loans can be made for up to twelve years although admittedly this is a "work in progress". The program is restricted to residents of Shelby County, or for those who have substantial Shelby County connections. The thinking here is that the funds are generated in Shelby County and therefore should go to residents there.



Next Week's Program...

Born in 1944, Steven L. Beshear is the



Democratic nominee in the 2007 Kentucky gubernatorial election. He is a former member of the Kentucky House of Representatives, a former Attorney General of Kentucky and a former Lieutenant Governor of Kentucky.

Beshear attended the

University of Kentucky, where he was a member of Delta Tau Delta social fraternity. He received a bachelor's degree and a law degree there. Beshear was elected to the Kentucky House of Representatives to begin his political career. He represented the 76th District and served in the House from 1974-1979. He was elected Attorney General of Kentucky in 1979, defeating Republican nominee Ron Snyder. Beshear served as Attorney General from 1980 to 1984.

In 1983, Beshear was elected lieutenant governor of Kentucky on a Democratic ticket headed by Martha Layne Collins. Beshear defeated Eugene P. Stuart, the running mate of Jim Bunning, 568,869 votes to 321,352.

In 1987, Beshear ran for Governor of Kentucky and lost in a packed Democratic primary field. Beshear then practiced law in Lexington. He was the Democratic nominee for the United States Senate in 1996, losing to incumbent Mitch McConnell.

On December 18, 2006, Beshear formally announced his candidacy for governor of Kentucky in the 2007 election with State Senator Daniel Mongiardo as his lieutenant governor. Beshear won the primary; each of his opponents conceded the race to him. Because he exceeded 40% of the vote, he avoided a runoff and will face incumbent Ernie Fletcher in the general election in November.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was John J. Johnson, Executive Director of the Human Rights Commission. He stated that, just like the Rotary Club, he believes in Service Above Self. His agency is charged by statute with the equal treatment of all persons and he enforces the federal and state Civil Rights laws. Everyone has the right to live without discrimination, and his agency fights discrimination in employment, public accommodations, and housing which includes race, age, gender, disability and family status. Unfortunately, poverty, prejudice, hatred and discrimination still exist. In 1960, the Human Rights Commission was formed and in 1966 Kentucky became the first Southern state to enact a state Civil Rights law. The Commission received 2,850 calls in 2006 about discrimination and 230 complaints were filed - the highest ever. The Human Rights Commission, however, is underfunded and has only 30 employees. Mr. Johnson has been active in the NAACP since he was seventeen. The NAACP was founded on the 100th birthday of Abraham Lincoln and it is fitting that with the upcoming bicentennial of Lincoln's birth that we recognize that social and economic disparities still exist in our society.







This Week's Speaker...

This week's Speaker was gubernatorial candidate Steve Beshear, an attorney and former State Representative, Attorney General, and Lieutenant Governor. Mr. Beshear reviewed where Kentucky is and where he sees us going. He outlined his plans to put Kentucky and Kentuckians first by, first of all, restoring the citizens' confidence in state government. He said he would set high ethical standards for himself and all others in his administration. He will propose a constitutional amendment to limit the Governor's power to pardon so that it can be used only after a person is tried and convicted. The public should have a chance to view the facts of the case so they can judge whether the Governor's use of the power was appropriate. Second, he said that he would assure state workers that the merit system will be followed and that they are recognized for the benefits they provide the state. Third, the state needs to provide early childhood education to children below the federal poverty level, so that they are able to compete later in the educational system. Fourth, the state must address the problem of college and university tuition increasing 83% since 2001. The state has put goals on the universities, but has inadequately funded them. He also proposes a Kentucky First forgivable loan program. For every year worked in Kentucky after graduation, the student would be forgiven one year of the loan. This will also stem Kentucky's "brain drain." A fifth area of concern is health care, with over 550,000 Kentuckians, 81,000 of them children, who lack insurance. Mr. Beshear recognized that health care is a national problem but said that KY can expand Medicaid and KCHP to cover those without insurance. Seniors have a lot of problems paying for prescription drugs, in part because of the gap in Medicare coverage after \$3,000. He said KY needs to fund a

program created, but not funded, in 2006, to provide income-based assistance with that gap. Sixth, while we need to keep trying to recruit businesses from outside KY, we need to recruit companies that provide better than minimum wage jobs and hold them accountable for the commitments they make regarding job creation. We need to do more to help our own businesses and entrepreneurs. Finally, he said that state government is paralyzed by partisanship. Everyone is fighting with everyone else, and a good idea is bad because of who proposed it. He said the state's motto "United We Stand, Divided We Fall" rings true. In response to questions, Mr. Beshear said that commitments to current state retirement system members and retirees must be kept. The state must meet its financial obligations to the systems. Leadership and restraint are the answers to the state's using any surplus to pay down our debt. He supports programs for preventive health care. He does not favor increases in taxes. He supports letting Kentuckians decide whether to have limited expanded gaming. He recognizes and plans to address problems in jail and prison crowding, which are due to financial and legal problems and to recidivism, particularly in the area of drugs. He advocated a multi-pronged approach to KY's drug problem, including keeping medical records in electronic form, with appropriate safeguards. A doctor can determine if a patient requesting a prescription has gone to other doctors for the same medication. The Club will donate the book When Abraham Talked to the Trees to Hearn Elementary School Library in out speaker's honor.



* Acknowledged the first meeting in December will be the club assembly meeting.



This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was Ernie Lewis, Executive Director of the state Public Defender System. He stated that the manner in which we treat poor people is a measure of what we are as a people. Before 1963, there was no federal constitutional right to counsel in non-capital cases, although a right did exist in capital cases since the "Scottsboro boys" case out of Arizona in the 1930s. With the famous Gideon case of 1963, all persons are entitled to counsel whether for a felony or misdemeanor. Before Gideon, Kentucky did have an indigent defense system where all lawyers were required to take such cases pro bono. In the early 1970s, Gov. Ford created the Office of Public Defenders. Last year, over 148,000 persons were represented by Public Defenders. Today, the Department for Public Advocacy has full-time lawyers who may not maintain a private practice and are paid starting salaries of \$38,000 per year. Each lawver handles about 436 cases and this translates into \$254 per case and four hours average spent on a case. Less than 7% of his budget is spent on administration. The Department of Public Advocacy cannot turn down any case assigned by a judge. The profile of the average defendant is that he or she is poor but these are mostly non-violent offenders -- many of them involved in drugs. 68% of all poor defendants have substance abuse problems and 64% of jail inmates have mental illnesses. Half are functionally illiterate. Half make less than \$10,000 per year. Many do not know who their father is, and most have not graduated from high school. Kentucky, just like the rest of the nation, has a problem with over-incarceration. There are seven times more persons incarcerated now than in 1970, although the crime rate is about the same. There are over 2.2 million in jail today and 22,000 in Kentucky but this does not reflect the crime rate or population. The prisons are full but none are being built. To maintain the present level, a new prison should be built every year from now until the year 2015. Because the prisons

are full, the jails are overcrowded to the extent of 22% The average prisoner only has 45 square feet and there is a critical shortage of prisons and lack of room within our prisons and jails. Consequently our prisons and jails are places of absolute misery. The problem lies with the legislatures, which are always raising misdemeanors to felonies and creating longer sentences. Politicians are using the crime problem for political reasons. It is popular, for example, for a politician to sound tough on crime. This nation has been turned into a prison industrial complex For example, the "three strikes and you're out" rule has resulted in incarcerating persons convicted of committing minor crimes for very long sentences including life. It costs the state of California \$30,000 a year to incarcerate one prisoner. In Kentucky, the cost of incarcerating prisoners cost \$7 million a year in 1970, and now that figure is \$300 million, a rise of \$20 million a year. Minnesota has about the same crime rate as Kentucky yet they incarcerate much fewer persons since the costs of incarceration are indexed to what the state can afford. Responding to questions from the floor, he stated that alternatives to the Persistent Felony Offender statute (formerly Habitual Criminal) include using the upper ranges of the offense instead of using the PFO statute. Prosecutors should not use the PFO laws as a plea bargaining tool, and should eliminate the PFO II statute entirely according to Professor Robert Lawson at the UK College of Law. We should use the prisons to incarcerate only when these persons cannot be treated any other way. We are presently treating 20% of those with addictions and it costs \$20,000 a year to incarcerate one inmate. As to the question as to why it takes so long to carry out the death penalty, he stated that 60% of death penalty cases are reversed on appeal and that over 200 persons have been exonerated who have received the death penalty. 16 persons were exonerated in Illinois, which put a moratorium on the death penalty, by former Governor Ryan.

As to the question of this country becoming a prison industrial complex, the system unfortunately benefits people financially from the present state of affairs of incarceration. Persons profit financially having a stream of inmates. For example, the most powerful union in California is the Prison Workers' Union. In honor of Ernie's talk, the book "Poetry for Young People" by Edgar Allen Poe has been donated to Westridge Elementary School.

This Week's Speaker...

The speaker for the day was District Governor Dave Weller who was making his 56th Club visit in the District. He informed us that Rotary International was started in 1910 and that the first International President was Paul Harris. The theme for his year is "Rotary Shares". We all share of our time, resources. and expertise. His areas of emphases are Literacy, Water, Health and Hunger, Family of Rotary, and Membership. In addition to our many Rotary programs and projects, Rotary is all about fun and making people feel welcome. He asked, "What would the world be without Rotary?" There are 1.2 million Rotarians in 32,000 clubs and 530 districts. The newest country to have a club is Laos. While we should work at membership all the time, unfortunately 90% of Rotarians never invite anyone to join. We need to "make the effort" by stretching our commitment to obtain new members by 5%. We have a great story to tell and should tell the story. Turning to the Foundation, the emphasis here is on educational and humanitarian goals. He pointed to the successful Ambassadorial Scholarship program, which last year had 717 scholars in 55 countries at a total cost of \$15 million. This is an effective economic development tool. He also noted the successes of the Group Study

Exchange, with 515 teams at a cost of \$3.6 million. Greg Fuchs is heading up a team to Japan in spring 2008. On the humanitarian front, we all want to leave a positive legacy. He pointed to the District Simplified Grant and local and international programs. Matching grants for example promote international programs. Rotary International will match dollar for dollar for funds given by the District. Water grants are of particular importance because in many countries, water is scare and the water that is found is often contaminated. In this country, we take for granted safe drinking water. Dave asked what is the value of human life? He pointed with pride to the matching grants that have been made available to communities in Mississippi which two years ago were hit hard by hurricanes. Rotarians contributed money from all over the world, and this money was in turn turned into matching grants. One example of Rotary at work was rebuilding a community center in Bay St. Louis, Mississippi. The PolioPlus campaign, which has effectively eliminated polio all over the world, is also a fine example of Rotary dollars at work. In honor of DG Dave's talk, "Stories for Young People" by Edgar Allen Poe has been donated to the Frankfort Middle School.

Singer Beyoncé Knowles immunizes Ethiopian children against polio

Rotarians taking part in a polio immunization campaign in Ethiopia recently enjoyed a boost of star power for the eradication effort. Singer Beyoncé Knowles, scheduled to perform in Addis Ababa, met the group and helped administer the oral polio vaccine before taking the stage on 20 October.

The 26-year-old, who immunized 10 youth said, "I want to encourage all ... parents to give this vaccination to their children. It really benefits their health."

"Beyoncé was so impressed [with] our commitment to not only provide funding but to make the trip to administer the vaccine," said Ezra Teshome, of the Rotary Club of University District of Seattle, Washington, USA, who led the effort. Teshome immigrated to the United States from Ethiopia in 1971 and has headed up seven other immunization drives in his homeland.

The fight to end polio has made significant progress in Ethiopia, which has not reported a single case of the disease this year. The country recorded 22 cases in 2005 and 17 in 2006 after an outbreak in the Horn of Africa.

In addition to raising and contributing funds, over one million Rotarians have volunteered their time and personal resources to help vaccinate more than two billion children in 122 countries during national immunization campaigns.


